

GETTING CLASSICAL

Today, Vidya Bhavani Suresh and B A Suresh own a publishing house - Skanda Publications and the fine arts school. Vidya has an assistant to help her out, and all seems to be hunky dory. Despite the apparent chaos, their entire machinery seems to be working on well oiled wheels. Yet, when they started out, all they had were a deep conviction and the genius that is Vidya Bhavani. Starting early, at the young age of three or so, Vidya Bhavani found that she was deeply interested in the fine arts and classical dance and she was passionate about singing.

BREAKING CONVENTIONS


In normal Brahmin families, when a daughter gets married, both parents are needed to perform certain rituals. Since Vidya Bhavani lost her father when she was barely five years, her mother brought her up single-handedly, going through a lot of hardships and pain. A traditional marriage would have meant having another couple to perform what her parents would have, in normal circumstances. The very thought of that happening was bothering her mother tremendously. Knowing the rituals, and sensing her mother's sadness about it, Suresh, a lawyer by profession and an atheist, told her not to worry. He promised her that she would be the one to give her daughter away in marriage. True to his word, the marriage was performed at the registrar's office, and Vidya Bhavani's mother was right by her daughter's side throughout. The marriage began a partnership that was to see many more unconventional moves.

THE MEGA LAUNCHES

Vidya and Suresh felt passionately about spreading awareness about the arts. They knew that just talks and performances wouldn't suffice. It was necessary to do something more concrete like a book. The couple went through sleepless nights to make their dream a reality. Crossing the first hurdle is always tough, but when that's done, the next one gets easier. With their first book, Appreciating Bharatha Natyam, their publication house, Skanda Publications was formally launched, in December 1999. The couple managed to rope in 30 sponsors. Around the same time, Rajni 25, a programme to mark actor Rajnikanth's 25th anniversary in the film industry, was being celebrated on a very large scale. One of the guests, Padma Subramaniam commented that after Rajni 25, the maximum sponsors were at the Skanda launch. But, the going was tough. Both Vidya and Suresh were working at the time, and had

to conduct their book-related activities during their spare time. "We would get one day off, and would try to catch up with 10 people, go from one meeting to the next," they recall. Naturally, they met with a lot of skepticism.

Even when the first publication hit the shelves and it got picked up faster than they ever imagined, the advertisers were not completely convinced, because the couple had 25 titles planned.
